

PARISH COUNCIL

BENCHES:

We are now in the process of placing/replacing benches around the village in the following locations: Greenfields bus stop; top of Bury Road in the green area away from the tree; Hillfoot Road (White City) and on the 'green' in Hillfoot Road/junction with Church View Avenue. There will also be a commemorative bench to be shortly located in Hanscombe End.

ELECTRIC CHARGING POINTS – VILLAGE HALL:

We have recently been asked about electric charging points at the Village Hall. As we are not responsible for the Hall or car park, the enquiry was passed to the VH management committee, who were not supportive of this request. Having spoken to Gravenhurst PC about the CBC plans to install electric charging points in their VH car park, apparently their car park is owned by CBC and not the PC/Village Hall Committee. This installation will remove not just a couple but 8 spaces, from an already low number of available parking areas, to make it worth doing.

OVERGROWN HEDGEROWS:

It is pleasing to see that a number of overgrown hedgerows have now received attention and been cut back, however one of two are still causing an obstruction or nuisance to both people on foot as well as highways traffic. Please could hedge owners ensure these are cut back promptly.

DOG BINS:

Although the Parish has 19 dog poo bins installed in key locations (map available from the Clerk), some areas continue to suffer from owners not taking responsibility for picking up their dog's poo and either place in an appropriate bin when passing or take home to their own black dustbin. This is an important consideration when getting a family pet. Marquis Hill has been particularly targeted recently with such inconsiderate behaviour. We have now requested another bin for this area and would hope it will be well used rather than sharing with other walkers by littering the pavement.

KING'S CORONATION:

In celebration of the above event, we will again be sponsoring commemorative mugs for the children at the Lower School. We were delighted to hear that Cllr. Thyne has been successful in securing a flypast of both spitfire and hurricane for us on 6th May at approximately 14:41 over Church Street as well as a spitfire to open Shillingfest over the Playing Fields on 24th June at approximately 11:49. Thank you!

VACANCY FOR CLERK TO PARISH COUNCIL

Shillington Parish Council has a vacancy for Clerk to Council, following the resignation of Mrs. Helen Smith after 5½ years of service.

The Parish Council has 10 elected members and we have formal monthly meetings on the first Tuesday of the month (apart from August). There are occasional extra meetings associated with planning applications and budget setting.

The position is part time, working from home, with hours of approximately 42.5 per month. Hours are flexible, but it is important to be available to attend monthly Parish Council meetings.

Salary is in accordance with Scale LC1 and conditions are in accordance with NALC (National Association of Local Councils) standard employment contracts for part-time Clerks, which will depend on experience and qualifications. Previous local government experience/CiLCA qualification would be desirable, but full training will be provided. Additional payments are made for hours worked over the norm.

Allowances are paid for use of a room, storage of equipment and documents, heating and lighting and internet access. Telephone line rental and calls on behalf of the Council are also paid, as is a travel allowance when using own car on Council business.

Summary of job description:

- ensure that the council conducts its business lawfully
- administer all the council's paperwork
- ensure that meeting papers are properly prepared and the public is aware of meeting times
- implement the council's decisions
- oversee the implementation of projects
- keep legal documents
- keep up to date by training/qualification
- maintain a basic parish council website and Facebook page

The Clerk is also the Responsible Financial Officer and duties include:

- managing budgets and all aspects of any business transaction
- completing VAT returns
- producing annual returns for assessment by external auditors
- accounting responsibilities (cash flow, etc)

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH SHILLINGTON & GRAVENHURST

As we reported in the February's Parish News issue we have said farewell to Revd. Richard Winslade at the beginning of January when he moved to Northumberland.

All Saints' Church is now in 'Vacancy', which means that for the time being, we do not have our own designated priest. It will be some months before a new Priest-in-Charge is appointed, however the church is carrying on. We have already welcomed a number visiting clergy including two Canons from St Albans Cathedral, Archdeacon Dave, Richard the Bishop of Bedford and our old friend Revd. Roger Wood to take our services. The Revd. Roger Wood is former Vicar of St. Margaret's Church, Streatley and he will be taking a number of services in the coming months.

On those Sundays when we have find ourselves without a priest we will manage with services of Morning Worship with Prayers & Hymns, sometimes taken by a 'Lay Minister', in place of a Holy Communion service. The start time of Sunday morning services will remain 9.30am.

We have two Weddings, a Wedding Blessing and Baptisms at the church, together with other normal church activities over the next few months.

The post for our new priest has been advertised and the recruitment process is well underway, we hope to report the progress in the next issue.

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) still meet to make decisions regarding church life. Other activities like Bell ringing, Choir, Bible study, 'Warm Space's' and social events continue as normal.

CBC WARD MEMBER'S REPORT for Shillington, Higham Gobion and Pegsdon alison.graham@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk 201462-713543

Well, as you probably know by now, this May I am retiring from local government, and also resigning from Shillington's parish council. So this is my last communication. And I am reminding



you to take photo ID to vote or you will be turned away, even if the polling officer is your Auntie Mabel. Ironically the postal vote system is unchanged, even though it was potential postal vote fraud which central government claimed made the new ID law necessary, so get a postal vote if you still can.

Again, it is a quiet time because CBC is now in 'purdah'. This is an Indian word referring to times when Indian women were secluded from public life. It became used by the British to mean a pre-election period during which no contentious decisions are taken. Essentially, the officers are keeping the ship on an even keel until the new council is formed. However before this, we had a very informative presentation from a senior official from the National Grid. Biggleswade is to have 'the largest investment in 30 years' – to form a new sub-station capable of producing up to 240 megawatts. It will cost £43 million, part funded by CBC, and a local network team will be set up. This sub-station is to meet the future need for more electricity, and more 'green' sourced power.

The National Grid was designed to output electricity, not to accept incoming power, such as wind or solar. The grid is now adapting itself to accept incoming, while at the same time providing outgoing, electricity. Power from wind farms and solar farms increasingly needs to be incorporated. As power becomes a scarcer commodity, the question for developers before they commit is; will they check the availability first, and decide house

developers before they commit is; will they check the availability first, and decide house numbers after? A question which arose during the recent Hanscombe End Road application, if you remember.

My swan song was to complain loudly to CBC about its new parking policy. It cannot be a one size fits all; of the 10 most common parking penalties cited by CBC, seven related only to urban streets. We do not have bus lanes, designated timed street parking spaces or roundabouts. The committee accepted that villages with their medieval streets and narrow minor roads cannot be submitted to a 'new estate system' of parking rules, but their needs must be tailormade.

And now to look over the last - what, 12 years? that I've been your ward member. The losses (not many) and victories (magnificent!) that we've seen together. Saving Thomas's Meadow – remember the TV crew? Successfully seeing off the recent attack on Hanscombe End Road, with the view from our historic church making the difference. The community, always supportive and welcoming, as I know from my arrival as a stranger 21 years ago, came together so strongly to survive the two lockdowns. The school, expanding to become a primary school, is doing well; the two beautiful churches, so different in their architecture, open their doors for food, warmth, comfort, solace; the pubs, now open again after the dismal black shutters came down. I must thank the parish council for always being behind its 'little rotweiler', and all of you, for your support over these years, the friendship, the jokes, the help. This is a very special community. Thank you.





Our AGM was held on the 2nd and it all went very smoothly. AN UNEXPECTED GUEST

It was beautiful but the snow and hard frosts that we had before Christmas 2022, followed by the very sudden thaw, has wreaked havoc in my garden. I've lost almost half of my shrubs; they just turned dark brown. It's sad to see. Something weird is happening to our weather; climate change is adversely impacting on my garden.



In late February we had a sunny day and I could feel a bit of warmth in the sun. I popped outside, leaving the door open, and heard a loud buzz. A bumblebee was busy on my Erica carnea's pink flowers. This plant is a great early food source for these special insects. When I returned indoors there was an even louder, but crosser sounding, buzzing noise in my

kitchen. It was a different species of bumblebee trying to get out of the window and he, or she, was rather big.

It brought back memories of spending a fascinating day with an entomologist who was carrying out an invertebrate survey of some old hedgerows. While surveying a green lane with high hedges, he gently scooped something off some bramble and held it out for me to take. I put out my hand, and as he opened his, he revealed a large bumblebee. I'm embarrassed to say that I gave a little squeal and took a quick step back. He gave me a look that was reminiscent of Dad's Army's Captain Mainwaring when he called Private Pike a "Stupid boy". The entomologist told me that the bumblebee was a male – it hadn't got an ovipositor so it couldn't sting. I took his word for it. It was amazing to hold this beautiful insect in the palm of my hand. I don't think the feeling was mutual as, after several seconds of grumpy buzzing, it took off. I obviously didn't smell of bramble flowers.

I didn't realise that it is only female bumblebees that have a sting. A bee's stinger is a modified egg-laying structure, or ovipositor, so only females are capable of stinging. It's a weapon of defence. It will only be used if a bee feels threatened. You can tell the difference between male and female bumblebees by looking at their back legs. If it's got pollen baskets then it's the latter.

As to the one in my kitchen window, I wasn't going to look too closely at the more dangerous and less intelligent end of its anatomy - it might have taken exception to me doing this - so I got a jar and a postcard. I spent a careful couple of minutes getting the bumblebee out of the window and into the jar before releasing it outside into the sunshine.



My sister-in-law and I were talking over lunch about the lovely sunny days we'd had and I mentioned the bumblebee that had flown into my kitchen. She told me that as one these insects had come into my house, I'll "soon receive some unexpected visitors". I hadn't heard of this lovely saying before – hopefully it's family and friends and not something unpleasant!

Bumblebees are wonderful creatures. We need these important pollinators and they need us to help them to survive. We can do this by leaving a less tidy area in our gardens and by not using pesticides. The Government needs to ban these extremely dangerous chemicals but I'm afraid it isn't going to. It knows about the devastating effect of pesticides on the environment so *why* isn't it banning them?

We are planning to bring other activities in too.




Meanwhile, the Rangers have also had a go at a food experiment: making armpit fudge. It's not as bad as it sounds – you put all the ingredients in a bag and squidge them together. They also made microwave mug cakes to eat with the fudge.



Our main trip out this term was to join 8,000 other members of Girlguiding and The Scout Association in a live version of Monopoly through the streets of London. We travelled by train, tube and bus and walked around 9 miles, taking in the sights as well as trying to visit as many London Monopoly properties as possible. Two of the Rangers decided that they wanted to make their promise in an iconic red telephone box.

Making your promise is meant to be a "mountain top moment" for Guides and Rangers – something that they will always remember. Three of the Guides made their promise while bouncing when we visited a trampoline park earlier in the term.


A very special THANK YOU

IN PRAISE OF DOG WALKERS by Revd. Angus McCormick 201462-712096 Minister of Shillington Congregationalist Church

So so often these regular walkers of dogs or people, who have agreed, or not, maybe to go out with their dogs are out there on their usual tracks and often stop for a good chat. Those dogs are so patient and often so friendly too. I usually greet the dog first of course. Are these walkers of dogs like their dogs?

Well I know when we had two collies we were known mostly as the owners of the two rough collies even though many people had no idea who we really were. Rex and Prince really were most popular. Like many dogs they loved to splash in any water and give a good shake afterwards as close to their owners as possible. These dogs knew we were their parents and they did look after us; warning of danger around the house, meeting and welcome after being left for some

time, giving us so much fun and free exercise, healing powers when we needed it, ready for meals at regular intervals which kept us regular too. Any spare piece of carrot was soon enjoyed by one of them and the other just tasted it and left it on the plate, ignoring any mouse that crossed their path leaving them for the cats, jumping back in disgust when woken from their slumbers by the sparks flying out from the open fire.



Great to get a welcome from Parker at the lower school. There are so many dogs now in places of work where I go each week, I sometimes wonder if I have wandered into a dogs' refuge. A change in attitude from earlier times when dogs were kept away from work places.

Anyhow, it's mainly the need to build up that friendly acceptance of each other that I hope we will keep developing in this wonderful village community. Regular, relaxed interchange whenever we can and not just if there is an emergency or a funeral. Taking the opportunity each day to connect with each other and value our neighbours. Remember those who cannot get out and about; remember that not all dogs are well treated; remember how hard it is for many of us to go just a short distance; remember not all disabilities are visible. For most dogs I've found that a gentle pat is welcomed just like a friendly nod or smile.



Yes of course there are many other wonderful pets kept by villagers and they all are special. So many owners have got their dogs from refuge centres. We know how many specially trained dogs there are in areas like bomb disposal, guide and hearing dogs, sheep dogs, dogs who sniff out drugs or help local people in dangerous places...

There are the sad and unhappy stories too of dogs doing something awful and not under control. Dog owners who still don't tidy up after their dogs. There are a lot of

dog bins in the village. There are stories of dogs never leaving their owners graves ... but however romantic or emotional that is the dog would be happier going for a walk and living as full a life as it is able to.

We are made like the dogs for living as full a life as we can with gentleness and kindness and smiling as much as possible. The flowers are blossoming.



Water - it's essential for life. Where would we be without it? It can cause problems though. We rely ultimately on rain to supply it but sometimes, we get too much, the wrong kind or not enough. After last year's dry summer, a wet autumn saw fields flooded and footpaths became quagmires in places.

We also had snow for several days with all the disruption that caused but after that, there was scarcely a drop of rain during January and February. A more unsettled March has brought some precipitation but not enough to prevent another hot, dry summer causing water shortages later in the year.

Obtaining water for drinking and watering crops is much harder in many other parts of the world. Much of the Middle East gets little rainfall but by manipulating the storage and supply of what water there is, civilisations have flourished there for thousands of years. People have completed astonishing feats of engineering to obtain it such as Siloam's Tunnel in Jerusalem which was constructed in about 700BC. Without the aid of any of the navigation systems that we use today, teams of tunnellers worked simultaneously from both sides of a hill and met successfully in the middle to create the 533 metre long pipe that brought spring water into the city. Even more remarkable was that the tunnel was not straight but curved.



Istanbul is another ancient city and now the largest metropolis in Europe with 17 million residents but is surrounded by sea on three sides and has no major rivers. When it was part of the Roman empire and called Byzantium, an aqueduct was built between AD117 and 138 to improve water supplies. In the 4th and 5th centuries, this was augmented with a

massive 267km long system of canals - the largest in the ancient world - to gather water from up to 70km away. The network included the 971m long , which has survived for nearly 2,000 years and straddles a major road leading into the city. With the area prone to earthquakes, it has needed numerous repairs but was still in use until the early 1900s. Not all of the early water infrastructure is so obvious. More than 200 ancient storage cisterns lie hidden beneath the streets of the old city. There are many more examples of ancient water management elsewhere in the world. China has a long history of manipulating its rivers to irrigate land in dry areas and canals built before 3,400BC have been traced in South America.



I haven't been to any of the above places but I have visited the mountainous island of Madeira where the lower slopes and most populated parts of the island rarely get rain. The volcanic soils are fertile though and to get water for crops, a 3,000km system of levadas (canals) brings it around and down the steep slopes. Their banks form an incredible

network of footpaths but you have to keep your wits about you when you use them as there are many perilous drops on one side. On a different holiday in Spain, we stayed in converted farm buildings near Grenada. The surrounding fields were flat and a range of crops were growing to supply the city with food.

Out walking one morning, I witnessed a local farmer directing water onto his vegetables. I hadn't noticed previously that a network of small, raised channels allowed every field to be irrigated.



We had a similar system in this country for water meadows where river water upstream was diverted onto grass when warmer weather arrived in spring to ensure there was a bumper crop of hay. Several such schemes operated in the valleys of Sussex but the nearest I have seen to here was in the Chess valley near the tiny village of Chenies in Buckinghamshire.

Although no longer in operation, the remains of channels and sluice sites are still visible there today.

Nowadays, obtaining water is easy but this was not always the case and it had to be hauled laboriously from wells using buckets. A piped supply reached Shillington in 1936 but it took many years for every home to be connected. Since then, our demand for water has increased but rainfall has become more erratic. Fortunately, Anglian Water are investing £5 million in underground pipes to connect their reservoirs so that they can move water around when local shortages occur. To plumb the reservoir at the top of Meppershall hill into this network, the road from Upton End will be closed from 22 May until 7 June.



We expect that the water delivered through our taps will be clean but recent television programmes have highlighted the contamination of many of our rivers by sewage and fertiliser runoff. I'll take a look at this in another edition of Rambling On.

A less well known spring flower is the Pulsatilla vulgaris or Pasque flower. Derived from the French name for Easter, as this is when it blooms. They have nodding bell-shaped flowers in purple, red or white. With silky, hairy foliage. They are the County flower of Hertfordshire and can be found on Therfield Heath, Royston.

This wildflower is actually a herb. It is seen as vulnerable and Kew Gardens bank the seed. They like well-drained soil in full sun. Pulsatillas don't like being disturbed and will self-set when established.

Legend has it they grew from the bloodshed by Romans and Danes as often found on battlefields. However, it is more likely that it thrives on ground that is undisturbed, which slot if battlefields are.

They belong to the Buttercup family and are loved by bees. If you see them for sale treat yourself! They come up year after year and look great in rock and Alpine gardens.
